The Importance of Professional Development for Educators

Why is professional development so important for educators? The main objective is to ensure that the knowledge and skills possessed by educators in BCU school remain relevant to the latest developments, especially in the world of education. Determining professional development activities for BCU school educators has its own challenges because it departs from the school's vision and mission which is expected to be effective in helping educators grow into future educators who are able to produce students who are ready to contribute actively to global citizenship with 21st century skills. Topics that are prioritized in determining the right professional development for BCU school educators are as follows:

- Teaching strategies that integrate social and emotional aspects of learning;
- Teaching strategies that foster 21st century global skills, namely communication & collaboration, creativity & critical thinking, intercultural competence & citizenship, emotional self-regulation & wellbeing, digital literacy.
- Communication skills, especially in English.

Most of the professional development activities attended by BCU educators are paid training organized by ANPS (Association of National & Drivate School) and Mentari Group. BCU school receives positive benefits by joining as member of ANPS because the trainings are held mostly in English which is in line with the school's support for BCU educators so that English skills continue to be improved along with enriching teaching strategies. In addition to getting reference books that support the BCU school curriculum, Mentari Group also offers a choice of relevant teacher training & the language of instruction is English.

The foundations laid in early childhood are critical for later emotional and mental wellness. Especially in the world's situation nowadays, its importance are of ...

There are 5 points that determine their wellbeing;

- 1. Infants experience and perceive a range of emotions.
- 2. Early positive interactions promote emotional wellness throughout lifespan.
- 3. Having appropriate expectations of young children's development is important
- 4. Parents and caregivers should be mindful of their own emotional well-being, seeking support if they need it.
- 5. Young children are resilient and, if properly supported, can overcome potentially traumatic events.

All these aspects are reflected and supported in how we deliver learning in TK. As a day to day routine, supporting awareness of their emotions are encouraged, hence learning to practice it in ways that are appropriately fitting. Understanding their development and how adults communicate with them, in hopes of creating a sort of resilience to thrive in the next level of learning.

Biology Experiment - Grade 6 & 10

At BCU, we try our best to make the learning process interesting and pleasant for all students so that they are inspired and motivated.

Science for grade 6, the students were asked to experiment with creating an electromagnetic device using simple materials around their daily lives such as batteries, paper clips, and other stuff.

They were also requested to observe and analyze various factors that could affect the strength of the electromagnetic field of the device that they created.

Meanwhile,1 in grade 10 for Biology, the students were asked to create a Herbarium. Herbarium is a collection of preserved plant specimens and collects related data that can be used for scientific studies. The Herbarium can also be used as research material for florists or taxonomists.

Herbarium is a tool that can also support other scientific studies such as ecological surveys, phytochemical studies, chromosome counting, perform comparative biological analysis and play a role in uncovering evolutionary studies.

The project to make this Herbarium was carried out at BCU's School Kitchen Garden so that students can easily obtain specimens and build bonds between students and the natural environment.

















Pre-semester holiday activity: Sports Day & Making Robot from Recycled Materials.

At the end of the first semester of the 2021/2022 academic year last December, before getting into the holiday season, BCU students participated in various pre-holiday fun activities which were also very useful in honing students' soft skills. Two of the activities carried out are Sports Day and making robot-themed crafts from used materials.

During the Sports Day, all BCU students from grades 1 to 12, were divided into several teams differentiated by colours and they took turns playing the games. Few of the games carried out during this event include mini soccer and walking using balloons without breaking them. It is not the competitive behaviour that was encouraged from this activity, but cooperation within the teams that do not prioritise personal interests and how students promote cohesiveness among team members. Thus, students are expected not only to be healthy due to participating in outdoor activities but also to form good character & behaviour.

The following day, students were assigned to make robot-themed crafts made from recycled materials. Their creativity is honed by creating joint designs & products. The collaborative work was carried away tremendously, Grade 9 and Grades 1-3 students worked alongside to produce amazing results crafts. What a truly fun activity, isn't it?











Mayor's Wife and Deputy Mayor's Visitations to Bina Cita Utama School.



Starting off this semester, we opened a new extracurricular class in grade 5: Amigurumi class. Amigurumi is the Japanese art of knitting or crocheting stuffed creatures or dolls.

It was a bit uncertain for us to begin at first, since the school suddenly had to close down again because of the increasing pandemic cases in the neighbourhood. But we decided to carry on with a few tweaks of method here and there, like preparing the crochet kit and sending them to each student and using YouTube and live google meet tutorial as we go.

Surprisingly, such an online method works quite well and by the end of the first term, they have managed to develop the essential skills for making an Amigurumi doll.

Although it is an extracurricular activity and it may seem unrelated to the academic activities at the school, Amigurumi art is beyond just crocheting.
